<p>CILC led a consortium that carried out this concluded project in Uganda. This project was established as a result of an assessment of training needs of the Justice Law and Order Sector in Uganda funded by Nuffic under the NPT programme. The project interventions aimed at building the capacity of the Judicial Studies Institute (JSI) (a semi-autonomous body that derives authority from the Judiciary of Uganda and the main body mandated to provide training to judicial officers and judiciary staff prior to joining and during their tenure at the Judiciary.</p> <p>The overall objective was to strengthen capacity of the JSI to develop and deliver relevant and practical training thereby improving the quality and capacity of Judiciary Staff and Judicial Officers in the administration of justice in Uganda. The project's ultimate goal was to contribute to improved quality and access to justice for the public. The main target group of the project were "officers of the court" including those in the wider Justice Law and Order Sector (JLOS) institutions such as prosecutors, investigators, probation officers, police court orderlies and Court prison officers. It took into consideration the relations with stakeholders in the justice sector such as the police, prosecutions, prisons, advocates, and the public to administer and deliver prompt and fair justice.</p> <p>The project was initially approved for three years but was later extended for another year.</p> <p>Five results areas were identified:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Legal status of the institute formalised and capacity for planning & management strengthened; facilitating the Administration of Justice Bill on autonomy of JSI • Capacity of staff and faculty to develop and implement practical training programmes strengthened; • Curriculum and course materials developed; • Law reporting and judicial practice based research and documentation enhanced; • Investment and teaching infrastructure and equipment purchased. <p>The project implementation began after the inception phase in February 2009 during which institutional and training needs assessment were conducted. Based on such assessment the project activities and implementation plan were affirmed. A task force of 14 members was established to develop new courses for the JSI curriculum. In 2011 and 2012 these courses were realised. April and May 2012, 6 pilot courses were delivered successfully.
